Notes for students and teachers

How to use this pack

This pack has been produced with secondary school aged children (KS4 & KS5) in mind. We recommend that due to the nature of the work and its themes, it is not suitable for younger children.

All the tasks can be done from home, requiring access to the internet, your camera or smartphone, and some basic household items.

It is helpful to follow the tasks in order.

Athena Papadopoulos was born in 1988 in Toronto, CA. She lives and works in Hull. Following her BFA at the University of British Columbia (Vancouver, CA), she completed her MFA at Goldsmiths (London, UK) in 2013.

Working across sculpture, painting, text and sound, Papadopoulos' practice defies traditional representations of the body, creating excessive, decaying and abject hybrid forms hovering between the worlds of the imagined and the real. Through a process of assemblage, her work is formed of found objects amassed and collaged together. Traditional binary perceptions of gender and sexuality are uprooted and unfixed.

The exhibition is inspired by her recently published book Cain and Abel Can't and Able, which gives the exhibition its title. Drawing from the biblical story of Cain and Abel, Papadopoulos reflects on her own personal experiences of sibling rivalry and competition within romantic relationships and crucially, the struggle between good and evil.

Centred around a dialogue written by Papadopoulos, in which an imagined narrative between two voices is played out, Cain and Abel Can't and Able explores themes of jealousy, lust and kindness. Papadopoulos transforms this dialogue into wall-based sculptural paintings, an experimental sound work which can be heard throughout the gallery space and pages of the text that reappear hidden, splayed and nesting within the installation.

Glossary and key terms

<u>Cain and Abel</u> - a biblical story from the book of Genesis. It is a story of murder and sibling rivalry.

Dichotomy - a distinct division, or something that is entirely different or opposed.

Emotive - something or someone which is able to arouse feelings and emotion.

Assemblage - the piecing together of items in a considered arrangement.

Hybrid - something which is created by combining two separate elements.

Task: Find two objects which give you an **emotive response**. They might be objects you love, or that you really dislike, or even objects that you do not know exactly what their purpose is or where they came from.


Draw your two objects in the boxes below.


Think about the **emotive response** these objects give you.

What words would you choose to describe the objects and the feelings they create for you?

Can you invent a **story** (no more than 1 sentence) for each of the objects? The story does not have to be the truth!

Surround each object with the words that you associate with these objects. Include the **story**.





Take another look at Papadopoulos' work.

Note how the objects are arranged, paying attention to texture, colour, text and shape.

These objects might be seen as a kind of 'sculptural collage'.
